

total raised \$26,500

This year's Little Black Dress Initiative more than doubled last year's inaugural effort. Thanks to the work of more than 70 JLS members, Little Black Dress blew past its initial goal of \$21,000 and raised more than \$26,500. The three \$1,000 matching donors including SGC Foodservice, the Lezah and Ron Stenger Family and one anonymous donor helped push LBDI to the finish line on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

The LBDI training luncheon on Wednesday hosted more than 30 JLS members to hear Francine Pratt speak about women and poverty in Springfield. The generosity of Twisted Mike's and Trailer Perk Coffee, and the many JLS members and members of the public who came for lunch, added another \$125 to the LBDI total.

CATHRYN "KITTY" COX LIPSCOMB

June 7, 1929-July 2, 2017

Cathryn "Kitty" Cox Lipscomb passed away at her father's namesake hospital (Cox) last July. "Kitty", as she was called by friends and family, cherished Springfield and was passionate about improving her community. Kitty Lipscomb was a charter member of JLS, joining the Community Service League in 1959. She served as League President from 1965-1967. In 2007, she was awarded Junior League of Springfield's Lifetime Achievement Award. Kitty's daughter-in-law, Tracy Lipscomb, and granddaughter-in-law, Lauren Lipscomb, are both members of the League following in her footsteps. She received dozens of honors and accolades over her 88 years. Kitty was named Springfield's Outstanding Philanthropist of the Year in 2010 with her husband Jack E Lipscomb. She also had a passion for preserving history. Kitty was President of the Museum of the Ozarks and sat on the Historical Site boards for both Springfield and Green County. She was credited along with other local historians for instigating the Bicentennial and History Museum for Springfield. She and Jack were major donors of the Lipscomb Family Wing of the Emergency Room at CoxHealth.



SHELLY SACHS

August 2, 1966 - August 10, 2017

Shelly Sachs passed away on August 10, 2017, surrounded by family at home in Springfield. Shelly was born Meschell Ann Warren in Exeter, Missouri on August 2, 1966. Shelly married Aaron Sachs on May 19, 1990. The couple welcomed two children into their home, Sarah and William (Will) Sachs. After graduating from Southwest Missouri State University with a BS in Communication, she began a career as a sales representative for Kraft until Will was born in 1997. Shelly joined the Junior League of Springfield in 1999 and was a much loved and dedicated volunteer. She was active with her church and a member of Highland Springs Country Club. Shelly was a vibrant individual who had a contagious smile and an infectious laugh. She loved her family and was passionate about people. Children always held a special place in her heart. You would often catch her at Will's games or at TJ Maxx with Sarah. She never met a stranger and treated everyone as family. So, it was a natural fit that Shelly was a greeter at James River Church.

I first met this woman when we attended ODI together nearly three years ago. We had never met before, and our League paths didn't cross much immediately following that training. However, more than four months later, when I gave birth to my first child, a thoughtful gift and note showed up on my front door from this one-of-a-kind woman. While the gift caught me completely off-guard, the thoughtfulness did not. The world needs more women like this year's Cheri Clark recipient.

Cheri Clark was an active Junior League volunteer who died tragically in 1989 while delivering a baby to its adoptive family on behalf of the Division of Family Services. Cheri's dedicated and cheerful spirit is alive today in the Junior League and exemplified in the Cheri Clark Bouquet of Enthusiasm recipients.

While the 2017-2018 provisional member year is wrapping up, we cannot help but look back at this year and the fantastic group of women who joined the Junior League. Over the course of the year, the provisional members got to know the organization and each other a little more each month at the Provisional Member Meetings and the General Membership Meetings. Two provisional members brought their outgoing personalities and strong friendship to the league, Michaela Steinmetz-Benton and Lindsay Mangum Maldonado. Below Lindsay and Michaela shed some light on how they met and how Junior League has impacted them this past year.

How did you two meet and how long have you known each other?

Michaela: We met in high school when she tried out for the Color Guard team! We became friends after some jerk broke her heart and I crawled under a bathroom stall to comfort her. Lindsay: I was seeing a guy who turned out to be cheating on me & Michaela took it upon herself to army crawl to me to give me a pep talk! The next day, I made her a mix cd & we've been best friends ever since! Michaela: We have known each other since May of 2005. 13 years!

Why did you decide to join Junior League?

Michaela: I joined Junior League after Tara Benson reached out to me. Tara and I are both in the same doctoral cohort and she told me about her experiences with the league. I was inspired to join and I'm so glad I did! Lindsay: Michaela told me about Junior League earlier this summer. As a pediatric nurse and blood donor, I loved the idea of reaching out to my community to help people.

What is your favorite Junior League memory so far?

Michaela: It is a tie! I had a blast at the holiday party this year. Lindsay and I got dressed up, ate too much, and shared laughs with other women in the league. It was a wonderful time! My other favorite memory was volunteering for Ozarks Food Harvest for our New Member Service Project. We made hundreds of meals for local families and did it while getting to know each other better. We laughed, we sweated, and it was a glorious time!

Have you had any moments where you thought you might have to quit?

Michaela: Yes, there were a few moments where I wanted to quit. I believe the League is something that can include a large spectrum of women, but I fear that women of a lower socioeconomic status are still limited from being able to participate in everything. For example, tickets to Charity Ball were \$100. Membership fees are \$125. Certain meetings are \$20-25 to attend. It may not seem like a lot to some, but there are women who want to join the organization to make a difference and can't simply because these numbers add up. However, I stayed because I value the mission of Junior League and the connections I have made. I also believe that the funds raised can make a difference to locals. Additionally, the training opportunities and informational sessions have helped me to grow as a person and develop a deeper love for my community.

How have the women in Junior League impacted your life?

Lindsay: The women of JL have educated me, sweated with me, and

worked side by side with me to serve women and kids in my area. I've drawn so much inspiration from the intelligence, grace, and compassion from the women of Springfield JL. I have so much fun with Junior League!



Michaela: Junior League members are strong, inspiring, and dedicated. They care about humanity and are taking extra steps to make a positive difference. There is something beautiful and profound about unique. exceptional women uniting for the common purpose of compassion. As a person who has overcome adversity as a youth thanks to the kindness of strangers, nothing is more motivating to me than getting to pay it forward and help youth overcome the difficulties they face. Serving on the Kids Count committee has been an eye-opening and deeply moving experience for me this year. I'm so glad I joined and stayed.

SCHOLARSHIPS

The JLS Scholarship in Memory of Mary Riley Wolfe



The Mary Riley Wolfe Memorial Scholarship has been awarded every year since 1995. It was established as a tribute to Mary Wolfe, a Junior League of Springfield past president, who lost her battle with cancer. Mary was a teacher and dedicated volunteer, who not only brought her

southern charm and grace to the Junior League of Springfield, but to our community. She was a kind and gentle woman who led by example. In an effort to honor Mary, the JLS scholarship program was established and named in her memory.

In the 2017-2018 academic year, the Junior League of Springfield anticipates awarding two \$1,500 scholarships to young women in our community in order to assist with the expenses of their college education. The scholarship committee looks at, among other things, the students' community involvement, volunteer impact, scholastic achievement and honors. Funds will be paid directly to the designated institution and are to be used only for tuition, books or lab fees.

The JLS Building Better Communities Scholarship

The Building Better Communities Scholarship was established to assist non-traditional female students to pursue their education in programs eligible to receive a professional certification or license upon graduation. Applicants must exhibit strong leadership skills and overall support of the Junior League mission. In the 2017-2018 academic year the Junior League of Springfield awarded three \$500 scholarships to women in our community in order to assist the recipients with the expense of their education.
